# ZIMBABWE BOOK A PLACE IN THE FINAL

ZIMBABWE have now trounced the West Indies twice. And the thousands of home supporters ready to cheer on their heroes at Old Trafford will be hoping that now Andy Flower's team have secured their place in next Saturday's NatWest Series Final, they may relax.

But the African side will not - and the Flower brothers, plus Johnson, Campbell and Co will be out to complete a dashing double over England. The tourists made easy work of the hosts when the sides met at The Oval last Saturday. Marcus Trescothick's hugely-impressive 79 on debut was not enough to make up for drab performances by other, more senior players.

Now Zimbabwe - buoyed by the 70-run whipping of the Windies at Canterbury on Tuesday, will be out to scuttle England's big batting names again. Neil Johnson led the wicket-taking exploits against Jimmy Adams' side, with two for 16 off six overs. Five other bowlers also chipped in with a wicket-apiece.

England will be hoping to banish memories of their sorry batting performance against the Windies at Lord's on Sunday, when only torrential rain saved them after collapsing to 158 for eight.

Trescothick's 49 and Graham Thorpe's 42 offered some cheer for supporters at the home of cricket, but assistance from more

batsmen will be required to set the Africans a decent target.

But England should beware, as Johnson, Guy Whittall and Campbell are fresh from big innings against the West Indies - and no doubt hungry for more runs.

## 10th July at Canterbury Zimbabwe beat West Indies by 70 runs

SIX DAYS, three wins, and Zimbabwe are already in the NatWest Series Lord's final before England and West Indies have even began to stir in the inaugural mid-sum-

The Canterbury outfield was slowed by the recent rain, and Zimbabwe struck only 50 runs in boundaries out of their total of 256 for four and made certain they galloped the rest.

It could be argued that vital runs were literally handed to them by crucial lapses in a sub-standard West Indies fielding display in which seven chances went

Perhaps the most crucial was offered by Alistair Campbell, who was five when Ridley Jacobs should have stumped him off Chris Gayle and he went on to make an influential 77 not out off 78 balls to add to his man-ofthe-match 80 against England at The Oval on Saturday.

The Windies played some loose strokes, and a run-out mix-up between captain Jimmy Adams and Brian Lara had West Indies tottering on the edge of the precipice at 40 for five

Jacobs owed his side some runs and made 37 before falling low to Grant Flower in the 43rd over after a stand of 54 with Nixon Mclean, who went on to complete 50 from 70 balls before West Indies ended the match at 186 for

To start with, Gayle clipped a catch to square-leg, then Sherwin Campbell mishit a shot to mid-on, and Wavell Hinds knocked back a return chance to Bryan Strang.

It was 23 for three and worse was to follow when Adams and Lara ended up at the same end, and next ball Lara played on to a pacy delivery from Heath Streak.

Zimbabwe were led by 83 in 111 balls from Guy Whittall in his 100th international after Neil Johnson had struck a bristling 51 in 68 deliveries.

Hinds failed to grasp the difficult chance offered by Johnson on 17 and then came the fluffed stumping opportunity by Jacobs off Campbell.

Man-of-the-match Whittall, too, was let off on 40, 49 and 80 by Rose, Sherwin Campbell and Hinds after a treble-juggle.



### Players to watch

### **Marcus Trescothick** Profile

On his debut in the first meeting between England and Zimbabwe, Somerset's Marcus Trescothick smashed a majestic 79 runs, handing his country a fantastic chance to make a winning start in the NatWest Series - but England collapsed. Trescothick, however, did his bit to revive spirits against the West Indies the following day with another good knock of 49. Now the 24-year-old will be out to set England up for victory against Zimbabwe in the crucial Old Trafford clash, England supporters will have their fingers crossed that he can produce

### 13th July at Old Trafford

ENGLAND'S Andrew Flintoff has underlined his commitment to England's cause ahead of the NatWest Series day-night clash with rampant Zimbabwe at Old Trafford.

The 22-year-old Lancashire all-rounder has been the subject of speculation since his late withdrawal from Sunday's NatWest Triangular Series match against the West Indies.

HE pulled out with the same back problem which forced him

onto the sidelines for the second Test against the West Indies at

Lord's less than a fortnight earlier.
Flintoff claims he has continued the rigorous training regime he adopted during the winter, which involves daily back exercises to strengthen the area which has caused him so many problems. "I've put on a bit of weight," he admitted. "I accept that, but nowhere near a stone like some have claimed - more like a couple of kilos.

"Last winter I worked hard to keep in shape and I think I succeeded. I haven't been doing anything different this summer - I know it's important to watch what I eat and drink

"My back's a real concern. I've had the problem since I was about 14," he admitted. "On Saturday it felt fine, but on Sunday morning when I woke up I was stiff and sore and couldn't guarantee bowling my 10 overs." Whether or not Flintoff plays, England will face a real test against a Zimbabwe side who have already qualified for the NatWest Series final at Lord's on July 22.

England fans will be hoping for a better performance by Darren Gough. Against Zimbabwe last Saturday, the Yorkshire fast bowler failed to pick up any of the African team's wickets. His ten overs cost 47 runs - more expensive than any other England bowler.

### Players to watch

### **Neil Johnson** Profile:

Neil Johnson got Zimbabwe off to a flyer when they won their opening match against the West Indies. His quickfire 95 proved more than enough on which to build a victory platform. Although he was out for a duck against England at The Oval on Saturday, Johnson again took to the Windies attack when the sides squared up for the second time in the NatWest Series at Canterbury on Tuesday. The opener rattled up 51 runs from 68 balls, including five fours, as Jimmy Adams' bowlers again struggled to break down the African side's upper batting order

### The Ground

Old Trafford, the home of Lancashire County Cricket Club, is a well-equipped ground with extensive facilities for both players and spectators and has a capacity of 20,000. The ground was badly damaged during the Second World War but has been returned to its former glory. Lancashire fans are remarkably loyal and it was a county match at Old Trafford that drew the biggest cricketing crowd in this country.

## **NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS**

O All matches will consists of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.

O Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.

Oln matches without a reserve day there is provision for for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.

O Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.

O At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 min-

utes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.

O Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each

O Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes.  $\odot$  The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled

time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled. O At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fieldsmen on the leg side.

O For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced. O No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted

match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.

O A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored. O Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in

calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored. O Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.

O Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.

O If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.

O The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing

on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

# THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.

2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.

3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team B's target
