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ENGLAND TRIUMPH IN **DRESS REHEARSAL**

Excitement is building ahead of Saturday's NatWest Series final between England and Zimbabwe at Lord's. But before the main event of the tournament takes place, thousands of fans are ready to descend on Trent Bridge to cheer on England and the West Indies. Nasser Hussain's team are planning to fine-tune their preparations for the showpiece climax of the NatWest Series at the home of cricket, but Jimmy Adams & Co are out to wreck England's build-up to the big day. But the Windies bowlers will have to provide more support for their big-scoring batsmen. Against Zimbabwe at Chester-le-Street, they amassed 287 runs from their 50 overs at the crease.

Sherwin Campbell was the star batsmen, with 105 priceless runs. But the Windies bowling attack was not sharp enough to kill off the Africans' challenge. Only Mervyn Dillon claimed wickets, and he could only muster two for 52 off 10 overs. The Zimbabweans did their best to throw away the chance of a glorious victory with two runs outs, but Murray Goodwin's unbeaten 112 from 137 balls - coupled with Grant Flower's quickfire contribution of 96 from 87 balls - saw the supposed NatWest Series outsiders to a memorable victory. And England have their own centurion for the Windies to beware of. Wicket keeper Alec Stewart hit 101 to steer England to a

strong total of 262 against Zimbabwe at Edgbaston on Tuesday. And with Hussain now back after three-and-a-half weeks on the sidelines with a broken thumb, he will be bidding to get one over on the West Indies before Saturday's final. Whatever happens at Trent Bridge, it is sure to be another carnival atmosphere with the boisterous Nottingham crowd.

18th July at Edgbaston England beat Zimbabwe by 52 runs

ENGLAND gave themselves a psychological boost ahead of Saturday's NatWest Series final as they overcame Zimbabwe by 52 runs in the day-night clash at Edgbaston.

A century from man-of-the-match Alec Stewart, his first for his country in one-day internationals for two-and-a-half years, was the cornerstone of England's 262 for eight in 50 overs.

Then two wickets in two balls from Graeme Hick including dangerman Neil Johnson helped England kill off the challenge of Zimbabwe after they had reached 85 for one in the 17th over.

They were eventually restricted to 210 for nine as England reeled off their third successive victory in the competition and put themselves in good heart for the Lord's showdown at the weekend.

Stewart justified Nasser Hussain's decision to bat first on a cracked pitch as he raced to his third one-day England century off 142 balls with eight

England only briefly faltered when they lost Andy Flintoff (24) and Hick (0) in the same over from Johnson as they slipped to 85 for three in the 17th

A quickfire 21 from Craig White including two sixes in an over from Grant Flower ensured England pressed home their advantage before the inevitable clatter of wickets in the closing overs.

Zimbabwe were looking untroubled as they reached 85 for one with Johnson moving to his third half-century in the tournament off 67 balls with five fours and a six.

Then came the decisive 23rd over from Hick in which Johnson (52) and Stuart Carlisle (0) were both caught behind by Stewart and Murray Goodwin was run out for a duck.

A second run out of Grant Flower (9) and two wickets in three overs for Craig White effectively killed the game as a contest to send the majority of the near 15,000 crowd home happy.

"We lost badly to them at The Oval and since then we have had two convincing wins but you only have to look at the way they knocked over the West Indies chasing 280 to know what they are capable of. "We have got to try and get a win on Thursday against the West Indies and then try and carry on what we have done at Old Trafford and here against Zimbabwe. "With the new ball, it was a pretty good wicket to bat on and Marcus Trescothick and myself got off to a bit of a flier. I think we had 40 on the board off the first four or five overs

"It set the tone. As the innings went on, the ball got softer and it was a little bit harder to hit it so we just knocked it around

"I thought the Graham Thorpe-Stewart partner-

ship was vital. We have had many innings together for Surrey and England. Running between the wickets and knowing each other's play was very important. "I thought Nasser Hussain and Craig White at the end were outstanding and really took the attack to them for the last six or seven overs which really pushed up to that 260. "I played a National League game here three weeks ago on a similar wicket under lights and we only had to chase 160 and we got there but it is harder because the wicket did get a little bit lower.

"But again we bowled well. We bowled pretty straight and made it difficult for their team to get anywhere near us. I thought about 240 was just above par and when we got 260 we were in the driving seat.






Key Man

England v West Indies

20th July at Trent Brigde

England captain Nasser Hussain has timed his comeback from injury to perfection. After three-and-a-half weeks out with a broken thumb, the Essex batsman returned from the sidelines in Tuesday's clash with Zimbabwe at Edgbaston

He was soon back in the runs, with a rapid 34 from just 37 balls, including four boundaries. Now Hussain is hoping his batsmen follow the lead of Alec Stewart, who rattled up a century in the day/night fix-

And the Surrey wicket keeper battered the Windies attack for 74 runs off 110 balls at Chester-le-

Street last Sunday, so knows how to get the better of Jimmy Adams' bowlers. Marcus Trescothick cracked a mightily-impressive 87 runs in that 10-wicket triumph. and he too will be in the market for a big knock at Trent Bridge.

Although the Hussain, Stewart and Trescothick trio are more than capable to notching up enough runs to set a formidable target, Adams knows his side have already got the better of them once this summer.

The Lord's clash on July 9 ended in a damp draw, but not until after the Windies had reduced England to 158 all out. Only Trescothick (49) and Graham Thorpe (42) offered any real resistance. So it's oneall, with one to play.

Adams' main concern ahead of the date in Nottingham is his bowlers' form. The batsmen raced to 287 against Zimbabwe at Chester-le-Street on Sunday, but the bowlers let the side down, with only Mervyn Dillion claiming wickets.

Now Adams will be desperate to salvage some pride after already being ruled out of the final. But Hussain will be sure to prevent any complacency seeping into his side, and keen to grab a victory to boost confidence before Saturday's final.

Player to watch

Craig White Profile:

The Yorkshire all-rounder blitzed 21 runs from just 11 balls against Zimbabwe at Edgbaston on Tuesday, so Jimmy Adams & Co would do well to beware of his explosive batting power. The 30-year-old's quickfire knock included two spectacular back-to-back sixes. The Zimbabweans have also learnt that White is handy with the ball. He grabbed two for 13 in England's eight-wicket triumph at Old Trafford last Thursday and will be keen to build on his tally for the series when he tears into the Windies at Trent Bridge

The Ground

The Nottingham ground will host England's last scheduled match before the final as they take on the West Indies and it is certain to be a memorable affair in front of a 15,000 full house at Trent Bridge. The ground has been redeveloped in recent years without sacrificing any of the architecture which makes the stadium such a traditional English venue and a favourite of many players. Trent Bridge stands in the middle of Nottingham's sporting centre alongside the city's two football grounds.

Player to watch

Sherwin Campbell Profile:

The West Indies opener is fresh from a sparkling cen-tury in the NatWest Series clash with Zimbabwe at Chester-le-Street on Sunday, and will be out to reproduce that form at Trent Bridge. Campbell battered 105 runs against the Africans, guiding the Windies to 260 before surrendering his prized wicket. His knock covered 137 balls and included eight boundaries. But Campbell was not so inform the previous day, when he could only manage 14 against England at the same venue, from 36 balls. He will be keen to improve on his performance against England's strike bowlers this time.

The Pitch

The Trent Bridge pitch is always likely to produce an entertaining contest in one-day cricket and hosted three superb World Cup matches last year. Although the strip might slightly favour bowlers, that didn't stop India and New Zealand piling up more than 500 runs in their Super Six match. England also beat NatWest Series opponents Zimbabwe at Trent Bridge in a World Cup group game.

NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS

- O All matches will consists of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.
- O Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.
- Oln matches without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.
- O Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.
- O At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.
 O Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each
- O Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20
- minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes. O The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled.
- O At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fieldsmen on the leg side.

 O For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.
- O No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.
- O A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- O Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- O Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.
- O Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.
- O If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.

 O The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing
- on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by

which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team
